Acute Response to Children Exposed to Violence (6 Clock Hours)

Thursday, June 22, 2006

9:00am- 4:00pm

Presenter: Dr. James Lewis III

Dr. James Lewis is the Chief Operating Officer for the National Center for Children Exposed to Violence at The Yale Child Study Center. He is a clinical neuropsychologist and nationally certified school psychologist. Currently, he teaches program development to systems of acute response to children exposed to violence, and the effects of trauma on a child's developmental processes. Dr. Lewis consults with the New Haven Urban Area Anti-terrorism Initiative, the Office for Victims of Crime and the International Criminal Investigative Training Assistance Program.

Dr. Lewis will be presenting "Acute Response to Children Exposed to Violence", a lecture on the operational overview and achievements of the Child Development—Community Policing Program (CD-CP). Dr. Lewis' lecture will focus upon data compiled from the program's interaction with the community and the future of the CD-CP program as a core component to the National Center for Children Exposed to Violence.

Presenter: Rosemary Creeden

Rosemary Creeden is a licensed independent social worker and Program Manager for the Children Who Witness Violence Program at Mental Health Services for Homeless Persons, Inc. She has served as Program Manager for this program (CWWV) since its inception in 1999. CWWV is a supportive program that focuses on the emotional well-being and safety of traumatized children and their families; the program seeks to help children and their parents identify, reduce and manage trauma distress symptoms.

Participants will gain an understanding of the positive impact the first responder's initial intervention may have on the child's mental health and recovery. The audience will increase their knowledge of the range of interventions that can be utilized either at the scene of violence or subsequent to the event. Attendees will gain knowledge of how to tailor interventions for both developmental and cultural appropriateness.

This workshop will focus on diagnosis and treatment of stress disorders as experienced by Social Services and Public Safety personnel. Strategies for stress inoculation will be offered.
